James Stouvenel – spoke about starting the Route 1 at 4:20 a.m. and running the route every 20 minutes to address crowding issues.

SRP 1 PRESENTATION BY THE PALMDALE HIGH SCHOOL (PHS) SOLAR FALCON RACE TEAM

Senior Chief Executive Officer Bryan Alcantara and the team presented an overview of the 2016 Solar Falcon Race Team's project, performance and challenge results. Mr. Alcantara noted that the team received many awards. One was the Michael Foree Award, which the team received for the best-utilized computer technology in the design, production and racing of their solar car. Chief Operating Officer Jenny Gomez presented information regarding diversity in the STEM program. Ms. Adili provided the team's goals and sponsorship requirements for their 2016/2017 project. Chairman Crist asked Director Flanagan to be the liaison between AVTA and PHS and for Director Hofbauer to be the liaison between the City of Palmdale and PHS.

The Board discussed the team presenting this item at Palmdale's City Council meeting, sponsorship for 2016/2017, and what the team has learned from the experience. The Board congratulated the team for their determination and teamwork. Executive Director Len Engel congratulated Graphics Designer Nate Pitkin for the design of the solar car graphics.

- Taft Electrical has begun installation of the electric bus charging stations at the AVTA facility.
- Chief Administrative Officer Norm Hickling is attending the California Transit Association (CTA) Lobby Days in Washington, D.C. and has meetings scheduled with Congressman Knight and Congressman McCarthy.
- Mr. Hickling, Director of Fleet and Facilities Mark Perry, and he will attend the 3rd Air Resources Board Advanced Clean Transit workshop in Sacramento on October 4.

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- The Caltrans Division of Rail and Mass Transportation is embarking on an effort to update the Statewide Transit Strategic Plan; he will be a member of the Plan Advisory Committee.
- He will present AVTA's success story to the Tennessee Public Transit Association in Memphis and Canadian Urban Transport Association in Vancouver.
- Staff is working with Lancaster Choice Energy on a grant from the California Energy Commission for vehicle grid integration. The grant will also fund a zero emission bus operator training program and support the adoption of zero emission buses in California and beyond. Staff is calling it the solutionLAB, a non-profit think tank creating zero emission transportation solutions at the intersection of environmental sustainability and cost effectiveness.
- He will be moderating CTA's Small Operators Awards Breakfast in Oakland and presenting the awards for Distinguished Service, Transit Innovation and Transit Agency of the Year. He will be presented with the Transit Professional of the Year Award during the breakfast.

Fuel, other operating expenses and salaries & wages were less then budget, partially offset by business software expenses.

That the Board of Directors receive and file the FY17 First Quarter LASD report for the period covering July 1 through September 30, 2016.

FISCAL IMPACT

No fiscal impact at this time.

DISCUSSION

Deputy Maselli and his K-9 partner, leka, worked a total of 444 hours during the first quarter of FY17.

At the beginning of each shift, Deputy Maselli contacted bus operators to ascertain if there were any concerns or problems to report, as well as anything that might have been reported from the previous day. On average, Deputy Maselli made contact with an estimated 25-30 buses/bus operators per day, and approximately 36,495 passengers.

Deputy Maselli monitored various locations that had reported problems. These locations included: Avenue J & Division Street, Avenue J & Challenger Way, Newgrove Avenue and 10th Street West, the Lancaster Senior Center, 6th Street East & Palmdale Boulevard, the Lancaster Metrolink Station, and Los Angeles County Supervisor Antonovich Beach Buses.

Deputy Maselli along with his K-9 partner leka, conducted high visibility K-9 terrorism and explosives deterrence sweeps at the AVTA office, AVTA transfer centers, on AVTA buses and at random bus stop locations throughout the Antelope Valley.

Deputy Maselli provided assistance during several traffic collisions, notifying dispatch and assisting AVTA bus operators with traffic control.

BACKGROUND

The Political Reform Act, California Government Code Section 81000, et seq., requires state and local government agencies to adopt and promulgate conflict of interest codes. AVTA's current Conflict of Interest Code required an amendment to change the titles of four staff positions (Executive Director to Executive Director/Chief Executive Officer, Director of Finance to Chief Financial Officer, Fleet and Facilities Manager to Director of Fleet and Facilities, and Project Engineer to Innovation Coordinator), add one position (Chief Administrative Officer), and modify the wording within Category 1, Category 5 and the footnote for Consultants and New Positions as indicated on page 2 of the Board of Supervisors (BOS) staff report (Attachment A).

IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT THE BOARD:

Approve the Conflict of Interest Codes for the Antelope Valley Transit Authority; El Segundo Unified School District; Hacienda La Puente Unified School District; La Puente Valley Regional Occupational Program; Pasadena Unified School District; Pomona Unified School District; Quartz Hill Water District; San Gabriel Valley Mosquito and Vector Control District; Verdugo Workforce Investment Board; and recognize the dissolution of the Chief Information Office and abolishment of their conflict of interest code, to be effective the day following your Board's approval.

PURPOSE/JUSTIFICATION OF RECOMMENDED ACTION

Pursuant to Government Code Section 87300, every local government agency must adopt and promulgate a Conflict of Interest Code. Agencies are required to amend their Conflict of Interest Codes when necessitated by changed circumstances pursuant to Government Code Section 87306.

In accordance with the Political Reform Act of 1974, the Board of Supervisors is the code reviewing body for Los Angeles County. The Board of Supervisors must approve an agency's code before it can take effect.

Implementation of Strategic Plan Goals

Approval of the attached codes broadly supports the County Strategic Goal of Operational Effectiveness/Fiscal Sustainability.

The proposed Conflict of Interest Codes have been thoroughly reviewed and approved by the code review staff in accordance with the procedures established by your Board.

FISCAL IMPACT/FINANCING

Local governmental agencies must have a Conflict of Interest Code in which individuals in designated positions are required to disclose financial interests at a level appropriate to their decision-making authority.

Adoption of a Conflict of Interest Code deters potential conflicts of interest, thereby averting misuse of public funds.

The recommended action has no effect on budget revenues and expenditures.

Incorporation of FPPC Regulation 18730 (2 California Code of Regulations, Section 18730) by Reference

The Political Reform Act (Government Code Section 81000, et seq.) requires state and local government agencies to adopt and promulgate conflict of interest codes. The Fair Political Practices Commission has adopted a regulation (2 Cal. Code of Regs. 18730), which contains the terms of a standard conflict of interest code. After public notice and hearing, it may be amended by the Fair Political Practices Commission to conform to amendments in the Political Reform Act. Therefore, the terms of 2 California Code of Regulations Section 18730, and any amendments to it duly adopted by the Fair Political Practices Commission, is hereby incorporated into the conflict of interest code of this agency by reference. This regulation and the attached Appendices (or Exhibits) designating officials and employees and establishing economic disclosure categories shall constitute the conflict of interest code of this agency.

Place of Filing of Statements of Economic Interests

All officials and employees required to submit a statement of economic interests shall file their statements with the agency head, or his or her designee. The agency shall make and retain a copy of all statements filed by its Governing Board Members, Alternate Board Members and Executive Director/Chief Executive Officer, and forward the originals of such statements to the Executive Office of the Board of Supervisors of Los Angeles County.

The agency shall retain the originals of statements for all other Designated Positions named in the agency's conflict of interest code. All retained statements, original or copied, shall be available for public inspection and reproduction (Gov. Code Section 81008).

CATEGORY 3

Persons in this category shall disclose all business positions, investments in, or income (including gifts, loans and travel payments) received from business entities that manufacture, provide or sell service and/or supplies of a type utilized by the agency and associated with the job assignment of designated positions assigned to this disclosure category.
